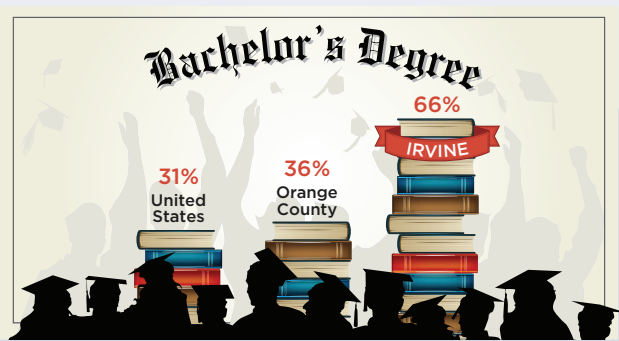
IRVINE FOOD DRIVES MAKE A DIFFERENCE

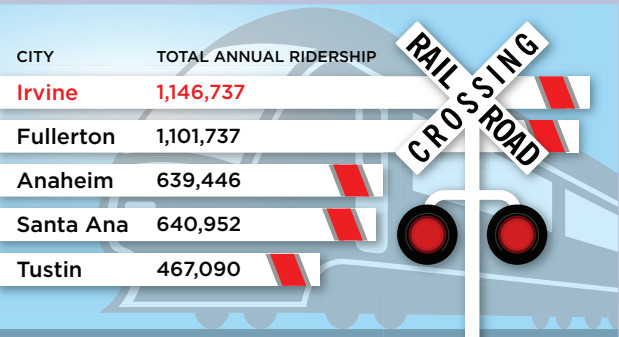
IRVINE NO. 1 FOR JOBS-TO-POPULATION RATIO



Irvine's jobs-to-population ratio was the highest among the 100 largest cities in the U.S. That puts Irvine's jobs base at 94.8% of its population or 204,253 jobs to a population of 215,529 (population data from 2011 U.S. Census Bureau).

IRVINE TRAIN STATION – BUSIEST IN ORANGE COUNTY

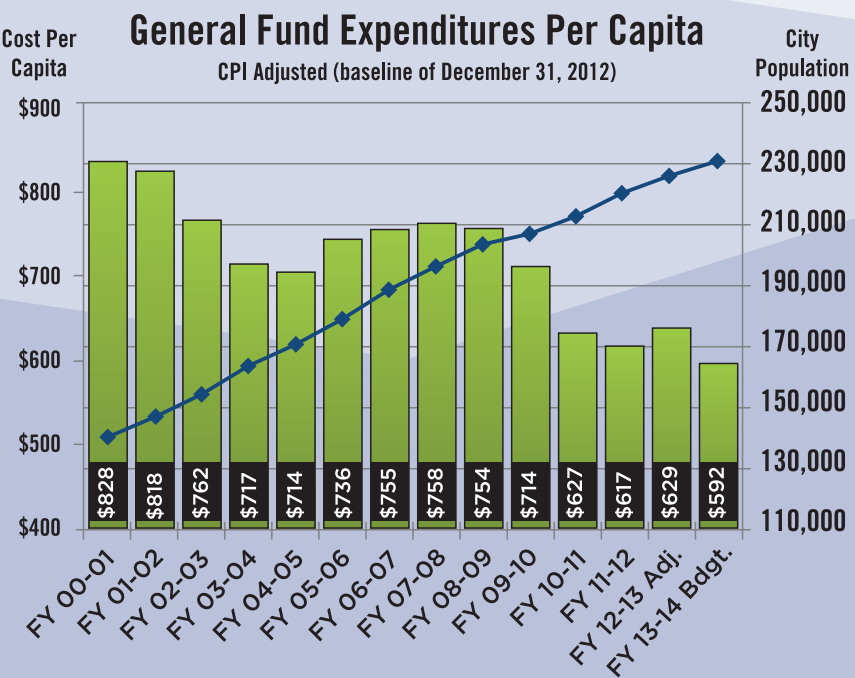


The Irvine Station, located in the Irvine Spectrum, is the busiest train station in Orange County, serving more than a million commuters annually.
