# WHAT IS A GUN VIOLENCE RESTRAINING ORDER?

California's Gun Violence Restraining Order (GVRO) offers family members, household members, and law enforcement a tool to temporarily remove firearms, ammunition, and magazines from an individual who is a danger to themselves or others.

A GVRO is a court order that:

- Prohibits the restrained person from possessing a gun, ammunition, or magazines
- Prohibits the restrained person from <u>purchasing</u> a gun, ammunition, or magazines
- Requires the restrained person to turn in guns, ammunition, and magazines to police or sell/store them with a licensed gun dealer

#### WHO CAN ASK FOR A GVRO?

Only an immediate family member or a law enforcement officer can ask the court for a GVRO.

Immediate family members include:

- Spouse or domestic partner
- Parents, children, siblings, grandparents, grandchildren, and their spouses, including any stepparent or stepgrandparent
- Spouse's parents, and any stepfamily member not listed above
- Any person who lives, or has lived, in the home within the last six months

#### LIMITS OF THE GVRO

A GVRO will NOT:

- Restrain the subject from contact with other persons
- Order the subject to stay away from any locations
- Order the subject to move out of their home

## OTHER TYPES OF RESTRAINING ORDERS

Five of the most common restraining orders in California include:

- Emergency Protective Orders: Local law enforcement can request an emergency protective order if a victim of domestic violence, child abuse, child abduction, stalking, elder abuse, or dependent adult abuse is at risk of imminent harm or danger
- Domestic Violence Restraining Orders: Protects victims of domestic violence if the victim and their abuser are in a domestic relationship or are closely related
- Civil Harassment Restraining Orders: Requested when the relationship between the victim and the abuser, stalker, or harasser is not considered to be a domestic relationship
- Elder/Dependent Adult Abuse Restraining Order: May be requested if the victim is 65 or older, or between 18 and 64 and a dependent adult
- Workplace Violence Restraining Order: Filed by an employer to protect an employee from violence, stalking, or harassment by another employee

#### GVRO LEGAL PROCESS

#### STEP 1 — Request a Petition

Request a petition from your local Superior Court or download here: courts.ca.gov/documents/gv100.pdf

#### **STEP 2** — Submit the Petition

Complete and submit the petition and other necessary paperwork to the court

#### STEP 3 - Judge Reviews Petition

A judge will review the petition and may issue a temporary GVRO that will remain in effect until a scheduled hearing. Once a temporary GVRO is issued, you may ask a law enforcement officer, a process server, or any adult who is not a party to the action to serve the order.

#### STEP 4 — Attend the Hearing

Attend the hearing scheduled by the court. The hearing will be scheduled 21 days after the temporary GVRO is issued. At the hearing the court may grant a GVRO that is in effect for up to one year.
